This seminar will present a powerful framework for increasing student engagement and ownership of learning, particularly for those who are struggling and/or have a history of negative experiences in schools. A Learning Partnership is a purposeful, culturally responsive relationship between the teacher and student and provides a "window" that enables teachers to better understand their students: multiple aspects of their identities; how they think; how they learn; and the selfperceptions and non-cognitive factors that affect their learning. The learning partnership also requires a "mirror" on the part of the educator: Who am I? What mindsets might consciously or unconsciously shape my teaching and interactions with students? What skills do I need to further develop? Learning Partnerships enable the building of trust across differences of identity (race, gender, class, family background, life experience, generation, etc.) and the leveraging of that trust in service of deeper ownership - and ultimately acceleration - of student learning.

Learning Partnerships are even more critical as students and educators alike navigate the demands of the Common Core. This framework helps to promote cultural responsiveness and heighten student engagement in the challenges of deeper learning. This approach can support teachers to get to the "core" of the Common Core: motivating all students to be independent learners who can understand and act on what they need to become college- and career-ready.

#### Who Should Attend
